**THIRD ANNUAL SESSION**

**NOVEMBER 22, 2019**

The Board convened at 10:30 A.M. in the Supervisors' Chambers at the Court House, Lake Pleasant, New York, with the Chairman, William G. Farber presiding. Mr. Farber led the members of the Board of Supervisors in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag, and an opening prayer.

Public Comment: No one present.

Reports of Standings/Special Committees:

Mr. Wells: Stated that he attended Inter-County in Saratoga County. They toured the new Emergency Services Building. There was discussion on Aid and Incentives to Municipalities (AIM) funding regarding cell towers. They need to continue to push and not let this be a dead zone like so much of the Adirondack Park is. The Chairman stated that it's important that each of us individually and cumulatively continue to push the cellular issues around the dead zone in every venue possible. Mr. Frey discussed his dealing with the Adirondack Council on this.

Mr. Wells asked the Chairman if he had any connections with AT&T. They blew up the land deal in Indian Lake. It should have been a win, win for both sides. The Chairman stated that the reality is that FirstNet is being pushed in a couple different directions to come here on the 4 tower sites. That was pushed as soon as the Federal government made the award. It doesn't matter if it's AT&T or Verizon they fall back into their negotiating stance. He stated how we have tried being up front with them so they know what is going on. He is not sure how it happened that both AT&T and the Town of Indian Lake were bidding against each other for the same piece of property. Mr. Wells stated that the Town is no longer bidding and he has been in contact with the land owner. The Chairman discussed further. Mr. Frey stated that AT&T is looking to move onto a T-Mobile tower.

At 11:00AM a motion was made to open the Public Hearing on the 2020 Tentative Budget by Mr. Frey, seconded by Mr. Tomlinson. Carried. No public present.

The Chairman stated that the Adirondack Lake Center for the Arts requested an increase. He did not add it to the tentative budget and his observation is that the decentralization grants have become more regional. We see money being pushed out far more up north than the days when it used to be the local communities and organizations doing really well. He hasn't personally observed them doing as much in the way of outreach. He asked the Board and they agreed to leave it flat. The Board agreed.

Mr. Wells stated that Peter Bauer, Executive Director for Protect the Adirondacks, has written an argument for the Rail Trail Biking piece. He lacks using the verbiage multi-use trail. The Chairman asked what trail he is opining on. Mr. Wells stated he believes it to be the North Creek to Thurman line. The Chairman goes on to discuss the rail trails. Mr. Wells stated that if anyone wants to read it, he believes it is in the Adirondack Almanack.

The Chairman asked if someone could share the notice for when the next Review Board meeting was scheduled.

Mr. Frey stated that he was excited to wrap up Finance. Thank you to everyone for their hard work and he felt that it was a good budget.

Nick Mauro, Town of Wells Supervisor-elect, asked how did Cathead Mountain make out. The Chairman stated that Hamilton County's position is still that we need a Constitutional Amendment to resolve the issue at Cathead Mountain. We have been negotiating with the Adirondack environmental groups on that issue and working with the Legislature to get that Amendment done. We were fortunate to do two or three additional field trips up there this fall bringing up the different people. Some of those people included: Assemblymen Santabarbara and Robert Smullen as well as Senator Tedisco's office. He stated that Tracy Eldridge, Highway Superintendent, and Soil & Water were both up there to scout and mark out an actual path. He talked about the proposal regarding crossing the Forest Preserve and club member property. There are ongoing conversations on whether or not they favor a utility corridor or solar array. The Amendment process and negotiations tend to be 5 to 10 years long so we are trying to expedite this one and get it done within 2 to 3 years. First passage this session. Second passage in 2021 because there will be a newly elected Legislature in the intervening election and then it goes on the ballot for November 2021. That allows us to do the construction in 2022.

#### RESOLUTIONS:

After the following resolution was placed on the floor; the Chairman explained that after the resolution was passed NYSAC had done a follow up conference call regarding opioid litigation and the issue became that the New York Counties were split. After the conversation our County Attorney recommended that we not opt out and instead opt in. Mr. Frey stated that we pay for legal advice so we should take it.

**RESCINDING RESOLUTION NO. 326-19 AUTHORIZING OPT OUT  
OF OPIOID LITIGATION NEGOTIATING CLASS**

**DATED: NOVEMBER 22, 2019**

**BY MR. FREY:**

WHEREAS, the Hamilton County Board of Supervisors pursuant to Resolution No. 326-19 duly adopted on November 18, 2019 authorized an opt out of the negotiating class of the MDL (multi district litigation) per recommendation of NY litigation counsel, namely. Napoli Shkolnik, PLLC, and

WHEREAS, said litigation counsel has advised of a change in circumstances necessitating an altering of strategy so as to permit greater strength in potential settlement negotiations, and

WHEREAS, said litigation counsel has per Updated Memorandum advised Hamilton County to rescind its prior authorized opt out and instead remain within the negotiating class of the MDL,

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that in accordance with the recommendation of NY litigation counsel, and the recommendation of the Hamilton County Attorney, the Hamilton County Board of Supervisors hereby rescinds Resolution No. 326-19 adopted November 18, 2019.

After the following resolution was placed on the floor; the Chairman stated that NACO has taken up the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) issue on cellular. They do have funding but are slow to roll that out. They have acknowledged that there are problems with the mapping. What we really need from FCC is to either fix the maps or create a process for people to submit better data. Getting by the fixing of the maps we need them to roll out the mobility funds because we need that subsidy if we are going to build cellular in the remote locations. If any of the Board is interested in representing that particular issue at that conference please think about that. They do it very similar to Adirondack Association of Towns and Villages (AATV) so it consumes a weekend.

WHEREAS, Hamilton County owned infrastructure of road and bridges received major damage from the torrential rain, and

WHEREAS, the County DPW department has begun repairing the damages to get roads and bridges reopened, and

WHEREAS, the DPW has needed to purchase materials such as crushed stone and crusher run gravel along with rental of equipment and has a contractor in place to begin repairing bridge abutment scouring, and

WHEREAS, the DPW needs to have funding available for these resources while state and federal government agencies complete damage assessments to possibly declare a disaster for Hamilton County for the related storm damage, and

WHEREAS, in the first instance the DPW Superintendent recommends the transfer of \$250,000.00 from the County Road Fund balance to fund the temporary repairs, be it
